## The Saint of the Month

*Martin Luther King, Jr - Born January 15, 1928 - Assassinated April 4, 1968  
Civil Rights Leader and Martyr - Feast Day April 4*

The Reverend Doctor Martin Luther King, Jr. grew up in Atlanta, Georgia. He skipped the ninth and 11th grades in High School, and at the age of 15 passed the entrance exam, and entered Morehouse College. He later graduated Crozer Theological Seminary, and Boston University. At age 26 in 1954 King was called as pastor of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama.

**The Saint of the Month Continued**

After Rosa Parks was arrested in 1955 for refusing to give up her seat on a public bus, the Montgomery bus boycott, led by King began and lasted for 385 days. The boycott resulted in the end of racial segregation on Montgomery buses. King's role in the boycott transformed him into a national figure and best known spokesman of the Civil rights Movement, and the Peace Movement.

King's life was devoted tirelessly to civil rights, justice and peace. His speeches resonated throughout the country, especially the "I Have a Dream" speech given in front of the Lincoln Memorial during the 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom.

... I still have a dream, a dream deeply rooted in the American dream -- one day this nation will rise up and live up to its creed, "We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men are created equal." I have a dream . . .

Dr. King's life and work is honored in the United Kingdom. He is remembered in Westminster Abbey in a chapel set aside for prayer. This chapel is dedicated to the memory of Modern Christian Martyrs.

On the facade over the Great West Door of Westminster Abbey were 10 empty niches: empty since in the 1500s. HM Queen Elizabeth gave permission for them to be filled with statues of modern Christian martyrs. In 1998 HM Queen Elizabeth accompanied by HRH Prince Phillip and clergy from religions from all over the world unveiled them during a religious service. The martyrs chosen by the Abbey represent religious persecution and oppression in each continent. In one of the niches a life-size statue portrays Dr. King wearing a robe and preaching stole. His right arm is raised with his index finger pointing up, and his left hand is outstretched palm up. A young child is positioned at his feet gazing up at him.

Westminster Abbey is a Royal Peculiar meaning that the Abbey clergy report directly to the monarch, not to a diocese or province of the Church.

Just a few examples: 1) I remember feeling utterly overwhelmed by Mary's grief as she witnessed her son dying on the cross. 2) I have felt confused by the apparent randomness of selecting Simon of Cyrene to carry His cross, and have wondered if I could have done it 3) I have felt horror at hearing the words, "He was despised and we knew Him not", counting myself among the "we". So – while the story IS the same, the understanding of the story is always new. And Easter Day is so very joyful after having truly participated in the events of Good Friday.

Whether this will be your first, or a recurring visit, I hope you will come to the service this year and travel prayerfully to each of the 14 stations.

In March the Vestry:

- Reviewed Diocesan Minimum Clergy Compensation Requirements
- Adjusted Father Courtney's pension premium to match his compensation (adjusted \$108)
- Accepted a favorable bid from Covenant HVAC to service our units each year (cost = \$500)
- Approved purchase of 10 additional hymnals (cost = \$201)
- Evaluated charity programs we currently assist and will help in the future
- Decided to meet next the week after Easter (4/25)
- Began discernment about fellowship activities
- Enacted a new policy that refreshments for funerals and visitations will be provided by the Vestry (and other groups willing to assist) for members of the parish and their survivors.

**Clergy Transitions**

The Rev. Rick Britton has announced his retirement. Rick has served as the Rector of St. Ann's, Nashville since August of 2008. Rick also served in the Diocese of Tennessee from 1980 - 1990. His last day at St. Ann's will be May 31, 2017.

Canon Pamela Snare has announced her retirement date as February 2018. I know the entire diocese joins with me in thanking Canon Snare for her service here in the Diocese of Tennessee. We are grateful for her ministry.
