Saint of the Month Constance and her Companions Commonly called, "The Martyrs of Memphis", 1878

Feast Day September 9 -In August, 1878, Yellow Fever returned to Memphis for the third time in ten years. Many citizens fled the city leaving 20,000 to face the pestilence. By the end of the plague more than 5,000 people had died.

In that time of panic many brave men and women; both lay and cleric remained as volunteers to assist the sick. Notable among these were Constance, Superior of the Sisters of St. Mary in Memphis and her companions. In 1873 the Sisters came to Memphis at the request of Bishop Quintard to found a girl's school adjacent to St. Mary's Cathedral.

When the epidemic began George C. Harris, Dean of the Cathedral and Sister Constance organized relief work. Helping them to minister to the sick were six of her Sisters, The Rev Charles C. Parsons, Rector of Grace and St Lazarus Church, Memphis and the Reverend Louis S. Schuyler assistant at Holy Innocents, Hoboken. The Cathedral group also included three physicians, two of whom were ordained Episcopal priests, and nurses from Memphis and New York. They have since been known as the "Martyrs of Memphis."

The Cathedral buildings were located in the most infected region of Memphis. Here among unspeakable horror these women and men of God gave relief to the sick, comfort to the dying and homes to many orphaned children. Only two workers escaped the Fever. (continued on page 2)

Member of the Month: Cathy Caster

Cathy Caster has been a member of St. James the Less since 2000, when she wandered into the Church seeking some kindred spirits. She is a born and raised “West Virginian” who left home at 17 and never looked back. After 4 years on an acting scholarship at West Virginia University, she made her maiden voyage to Tennessee to attend graduate school at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. It was at the University of Tennessee that fate intervened and assigned Cathy to the great Broadway director, Albert Marre, who was in Knoxville directing a “pre-broadway” play. When the play moved to the Palace Theatre in New York City, Marre and the other cast members convinced Cathy to move there and try her hand at acting and directing. She lived and worked in NYC for 13 years: first as an assistant to Albert Marre, then as a restaurant and public relations manager.

In 1992 she made the decision to move to Nashville. She chose Nashville because her best friend had moved to Nashville the previous year, and because she wanted to return to academic life. Her mother suggested that she would make a good lawyer (something about being pig-headed and loving to argue). She

The six martyred Sisters and priests are buried in Elmwood Cemetery. The monument marking the joint grave Fathers Parsons and Schuyler bears the inscription: “Greater Love Hath No Man.”

The High Altar at St Mary’s Cathedral, Memphis is dedicated to the Sisters.

So what is Cursillo? Cursillo is a movement within the Episcopal Church that rises up and supports Christian leaders in ministry, helping them live out the Great Commission. During a three-day retreat, participants focus on the essentials of the Christian message, hear the call to take up their role as leaders in all the environments in which God has placed them, and receive tools to support their individual personal commitments to increased piety, study, and action through small friendship groups.
